

Research shows that families with disabled children often have a lower family income parents are unable to work due to having to care for their child full-time and an estimate 20% of families go without all the heating th

Caudwell Children has been awarded a grant from the Energy Saving Trust to operate a new service, known as the Energy Industry Voluntary Redress Scheme, to address this important issue.
