Report on Pupil Premium Funding 2015/16/17/18.

The school has received a substantial amount of funding to support pupils who are disadvantaged in comparison to their peers. As a school we think very carefully about the individual pupil and their needs. As a high percentage of our population are able to access provision supported by this funding we have been able to invest this over time to develop a wide range of services to meet the children's needs, both academically and at a social/emotional level.

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) 2017/18

Schools receive an additional payment called Pupil Premium Grant (PPG), for each pupil who is registered for free school meals, those who are in the care of the local authority or (from April 2014) are adopted and those whose parents are serving in the armed forces.

In 2017 - 18 Two Rivers Primary were allocated a PPG of £54120. 35.09% of pupils are currently receiving free school meals or have received them during the past 6 years. There are currently 3 pupils in the care of the local authority, receiving £500/£600 per term, who's funding is broken down through the EPeP system. 2 pupils who have left the care of the local authority.

For the majority of the pupils at Two Rivers Primary there are significant barriers to learning & achievement and we are using our PPG to try and reduce the negative impact of some of these barriers, increase access to differentiated & appropriate curricula & raise the levels of attainment & progression for all.




























Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) 2016/17

Schools receive an additional payment called Pupil Premium Grant (PPG), for each pupil who is registered for free school meals, those who are in the care of the local authority or (from April 2014) are adopted and those whose parents are serving in the armed forces.

In 2016 - 17 Two Rivers Primary were allocated a PPG of £46,200. 40% of pupils are currently receiving free school meals or have received them during the past 6 years. There are currently 3 pupils in the care of the local authority and 2 pupils who have left the care of the local authority.

For the majority of the pupils at Two Rivers Primary there are significant barriers to learning & achievement and we are using our PPG to try and reduce the negative impact of some of these barriers, increase access to differentiated & appropriate curricula & raise the levels of attainment & progression for all.

For the majority of the pupils at Two Rivers Primary there are significant barriers to learning & achievement and we are using our PPG to try and reduce the negative impact of some of these barriers, increase access to differentiated & appropriate curricula & raise the levels of attainment & progression for all.
