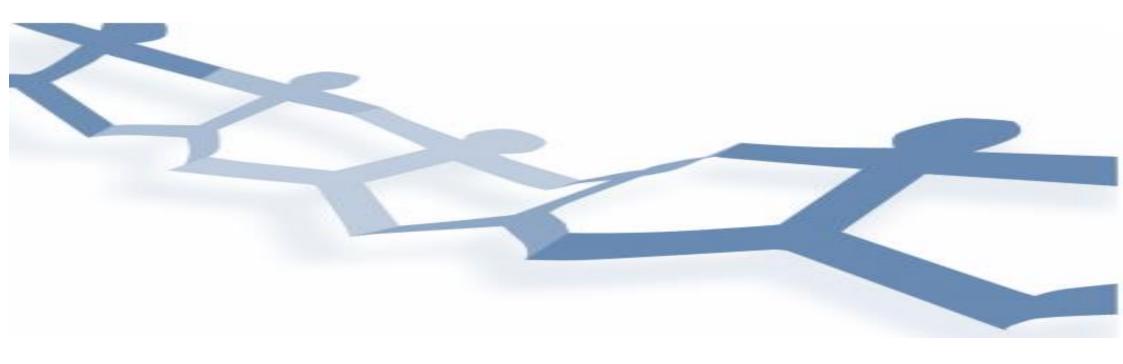

Pupil Premium grant 2019-20 update



Funding Summary

Schools receive an additional payment called Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) for each pupil who is registered for free school meals over the last 6 years, those who are in the care of the local authority or (from April 2014) are adopted and those whose parents are serving in the armed forces.

There are currently 4 pupils (3 in years 7 - 11) in the care of the local authority. Looked after children receive Pupil Premium Plus. This money is held by the Virtual School Head and released to school on completion of the appropriate personalised targets begin set in the PEP meetings.

In 2019/20 Two Rivers High School was allocated a PPG of $\pm 53,295$ 45% of students in years 7 – 11 are currently meeting the criteria stated above.

Barriers to Attainment

- All pupils have an Education, Health and Care Plan
- All pupils have some level of cognition and learning difficulties
- 22 students have Severe Learning Difficulties
- 16 students speech language and communication difficulties
- 10 students have SEMH difficulties
- 11 students have ASD difficulties

Funding Breakdown

For the majority of pupils at Two Rivers High School there are significant barriers to learning and achievement and we are using our PPG to try and reduce the negative impact of some of these barriers, increase access to differentiated and appropriate curricula & raise the levels of attainment and progression for all.

Pupils who received pupil premium funding will have benefitted from one or more of the following additional provisions:

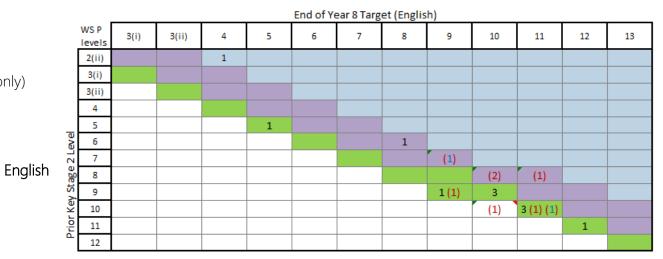
- Therapy interventions
- Group Music lessons with an external provider
- Counselling
- Decreased class sizes or extra TA support in some lessons
- Alternative curriculum e.g. alternative PE group, Outdoor centre, Bebop sessions, Whitemoor Lakes
- Purchase of equipment/software to support learning
- Support for behaviour
- Cultural trips e.g. Cinema, Cadbury World, Bendrigg residential Centre, Italy, Standon Bowers
- Educational trips e.g. Stratford on Avon, Conkers
- Provision of the Pupil Support Officer.

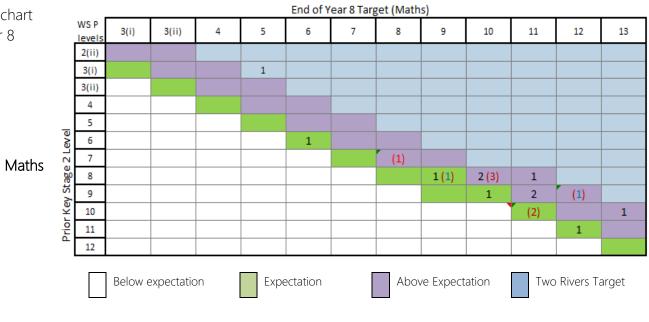
2018-19 Attainment
